



The Water Cycle


Water is essential to all life on Earth.

In its three phases (solid, liquid, and gas), water ties together the major parts of the Earth's climate system.

Air, clouds, the ocean, lakes, vegetation, snowpack and glaciers.


What Is A Watershed?

A watershed is the land area that channels rainfall to creeks, streams, rivers, and eventually to reservoirs, bays, and the ocean. In other words, all of the land in Orange County drains to at least one body of water; so no matter where you stand, you are in a watershed! All drainage ultimately leads to the ocean by traveling through the watershed.




80% Of The Garbage That Ends Up In Waterways Comes From Land

Garbage can easily become aquatic trash if it is not properly disposed of or securely contained. When garbage is littered on the ground rather than placed in a recycle, compost, or trash bin, rain and wind often carries it into storm drains, streams, canals, and rivers, then eventually ends up in the ocean.



Through wind and rain, a plastic bag thrown away in Minnesota can make its way into streams, rivers and eventually the ocean and then the gyres.

What Is Plastic Made From?

Plastic Is Forever



Every single piece of plastic ever made still exists.

91% of plastic waste isn't recycled.

Every day around 8 million pieces of plastic makes their way into our oceans.

Up to 80% of marine debris is plastic and comes from runoff, creating a steady stream of plastic into the ocean.

In the marine environment, plastics do not biodegrade, they photo-degrade, breaking up from recognizable items of all sizes and shapes into tiny particulates.
